Matthew 8:18-22

Introduction: The cost of following Jesus as he is
1. Following Jesus as he is necessarily leads to earthly uncertainty - Easy words
- Hard realities
2. Following Jesus as he is necessarily demands our supreme love
- An exclusive and universal priority (cf. Numbers 6:6-7; Leviticus 21:11)
- A love that orders all others (Matthew 12:48-49; 19:49)
